2017-18 Tasmanian Economy – Continuing to Strengthen

Under the Hodgman Liberal Government, our economy is forecast to grow at the fastest rate in ten years, more than 6,400 jobs have been created, we have balanced the budget and we are building Tasmania's future.

This is a far cry from the last Labor-Green Government, when the state had negative growth in 2012-13, the unemployment rate rose to over eight percent, and business confidence was the lowest in the country.

Now, the outlook for the Tasmanian economy is positive with strong consumer spending, a confident business sector and a booming tourism industry driving jobs and investment across the State.

Tasmania's economic outlook has improved considerably, with expected above long term-trend growth in GSP of 2.5 per cent in 2017-18 and growth of 2 per cent across the Forward Estimates (refer Chart 1).

Our population is growing at the fastest annual rate in five years with a return to net positive interstate migration inflow. These trends are expected to continue over the medium term.

Directly and indirectly, the tourism sector contributes \$2.5 billion annually to the Tasmanian economy and represents 9.9 per cent of Gross State Product. More visitors are coming than ever before and they are spending more. In the year to December 2016, 1.24 million visitors came to Tasmania and visitor expenditure increased by 10 per cent to \$2.14 billion.

Retail spending continues to grow. Retail trade has grown consistently in recent years and has now had a record eleven consecutive months above the half-billion dollar mark. Retail turnover is now 11 per cent above the level at the last election.

According to recent surveys by both Sensis and the TCCL, small and medium business confidence remains strongly positive, with the level of regional business confidence particularly notable. Various other reports and commentators have expressed similar views over recent months. Confidence is essential to encouraging economic growth. When businesses have confidence in the future, they are willing to invest, take on new employees and take up opportunities for growth.

All of these factors will drive change and growth in the Tasmanian economy into the future and the Hodgman Liberal Government will continue to provide the foundations for growth.

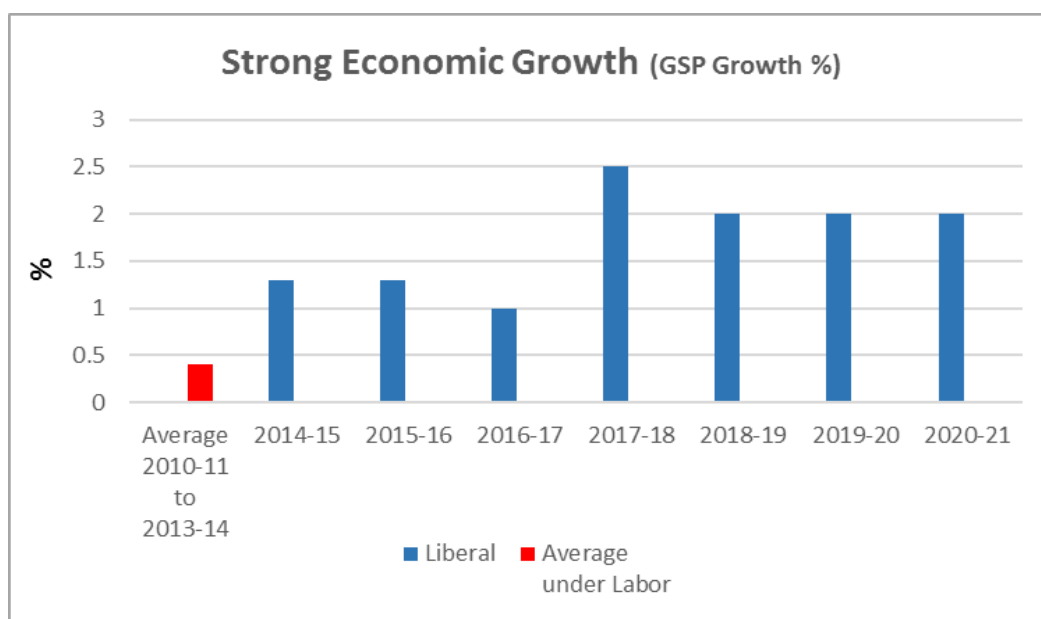


Chart 1 - Gross State Product Growth, Actual ABS figures 2010-11 to 2015-16, Treasury Forecast 2016-17 to 2020-21



2017-18 Budget landscape – Building Tasmania's Future

A stronger economy and improved levels of confidence are driving higher levels of activity. This has helped to increase own source revenues, which has in turn helped strengthen the Budget position and provide us with more flexibility.

In 2015-16 we returned to surplus four years ahead of schedule. This provides us with the capacity to do more, however, recent experience has taught us to be prudent and not to over commit with income that may not be certain into the future.

Our ongoing discipline, which commenced in the 2014-15 Budget, has allowed us to lay the foundations so that we can reinvest in essential services into the future, despite the challenges we have faced along the way. We can now proudly claim to have a balanced budget in each and every year of the Budget and Forward Estimates period, the first time that this has occurred in almost a decade.

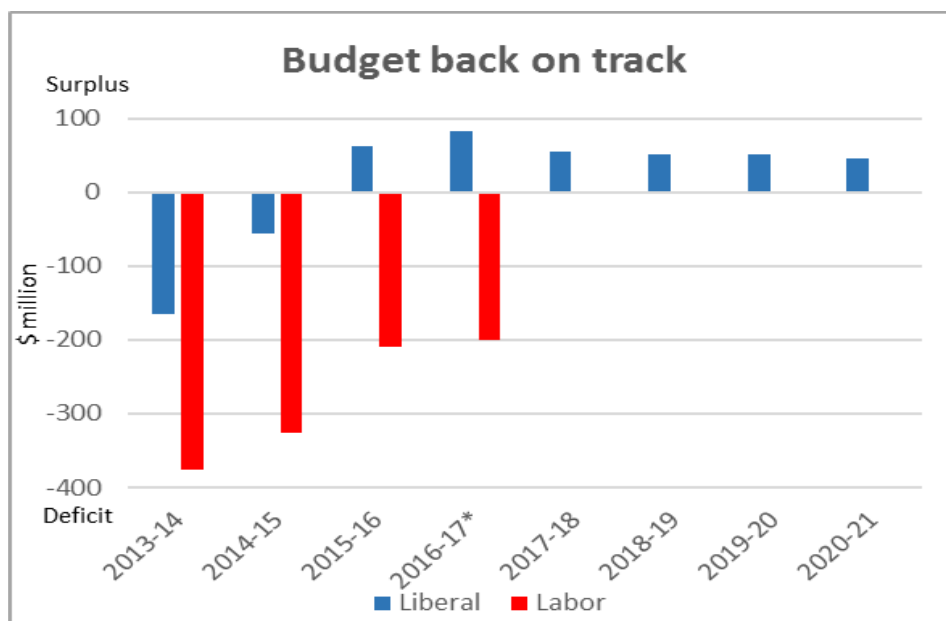


Chart 2 - Operating Surplus/Deficit

The 2017-18 Budget

Key points

2017-18 Fiscal Situation

The Hodgman Liberal Government's strong and disciplined Budget management means the Budget is back on track and we are able to invest in building Tasmania's future. The State Budget has returned to surplus, well ahead of schedule and we have a forecast surplus in each and every year of the Forward Estimates.

The \$1.1 billion Labor-Green cumulative deficit we inherited is now forecast to be a cumulative surplus of more than \$200 million over the Budget and Forward Estimates period – illustrated in Chart 2.

We have turned around the net debt position, which is a dramatic improvement compared to the predicted \$400 million of net debt under Labor and the Greens. In fact, it is now forecast we will have net cash and investments of \$452 million in 2017-18 and a positive balance across the entire Forward Estimates period (Chart 3).

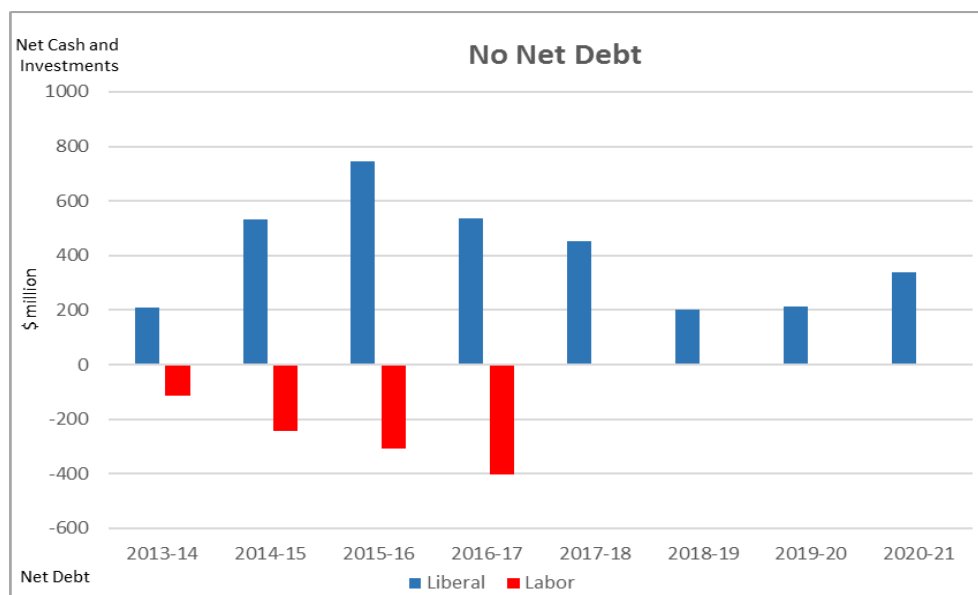


Chart 3 - Labor Net debt projections, Liberal actual outcomes and 2017-18 Budget Forward Estimates

TASMANIAN BUDGET 2017-18

We are building Tasmania's future by stepping up the level of investment in job creating infrastructure. More than \$2 billion will be invested in infrastructure over the Budget and Forward Estimates (Chart 4).

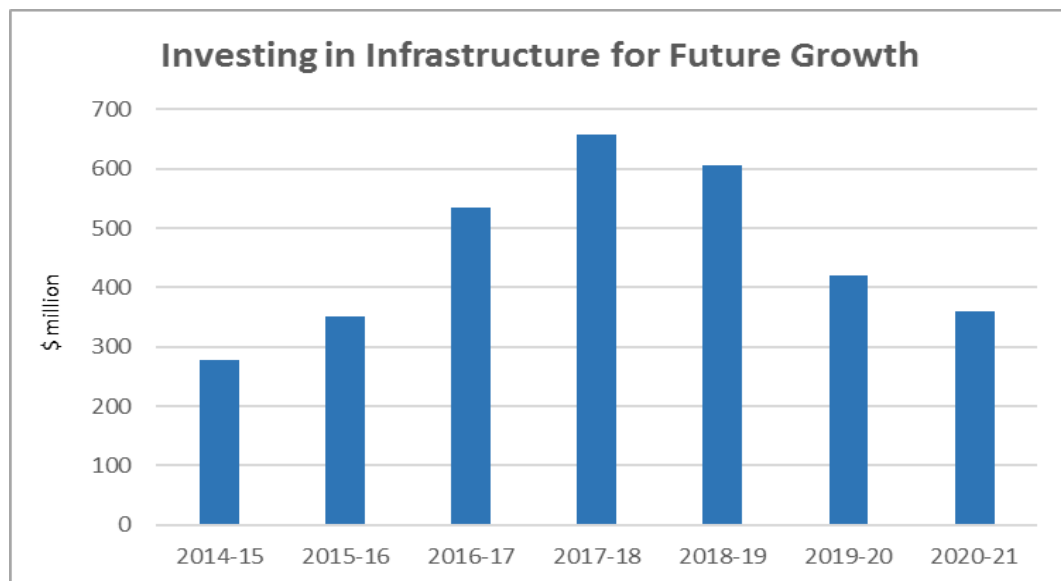


Chart 4 - Infrastructure Investment 2014-15 to 2020-21

\$827 million is being invested in roads and bridges, almost \$500 million into hospitals and health and \$117 million into better schools and TAFE buildings.

We have allocated over \$60 million to Digital Transformation Priority Expenditure. This will fund the replacement of important legacy systems across Tasmania Police, the Department of Justice and the Department of Health and Human Services. The replacement of these systems will support frontline workers in providing better services to the community.

The overall infrastructure program will help drive future economic growth and improve services for the benefit of the whole community.

Over the period from when the Liberals took office until the end of the Forward Estimates period, we have restrained spending increases to just 2.4 per cent, less than the revenue growth rate of 2.7 per cent. In contrast, in the last 8 years of Labor and the Greens, expenditure grew at 4.8 per cent per year.

While being prudent with our expenditure has meant that over time the Budget has been able to return to a sustainable position, this has not come at the expense of essential services. There has been a significant investment in frontline services under the Hodgman Liberal Government. This is being further boosted in this Budget. (Chart 5).

The Health system in particular will benefit from the biggest ever increase in expenditure, with an extra \$658 million budgeted over the Budget and Forward Estimate period delivering 106 new beds.

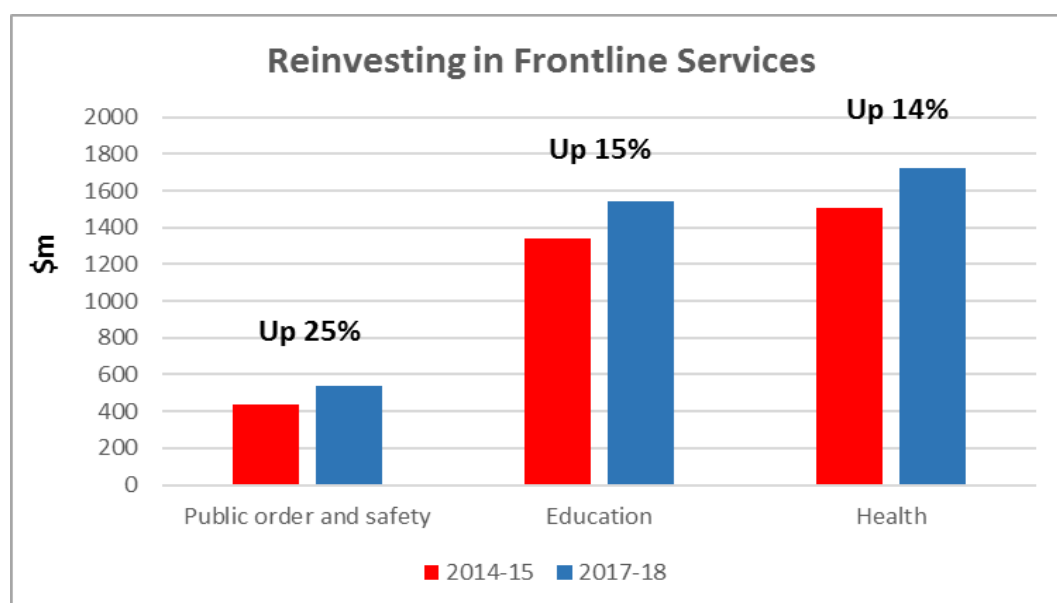


Chart 5 – Increase in expenditure on frontline services

The Hodgman Liberal Government did not make the same mistakes as previous Tasmanian Governments and those in other Australian States, in failing to take a long-term view and committing to unsustainable recurrent spending in response to a short-term funding increase. Our prudent and sensible financial approach has been vindicated.

We promised to fix the Budget mess so we could afford to reinvest in essential services and that is what we are doing.

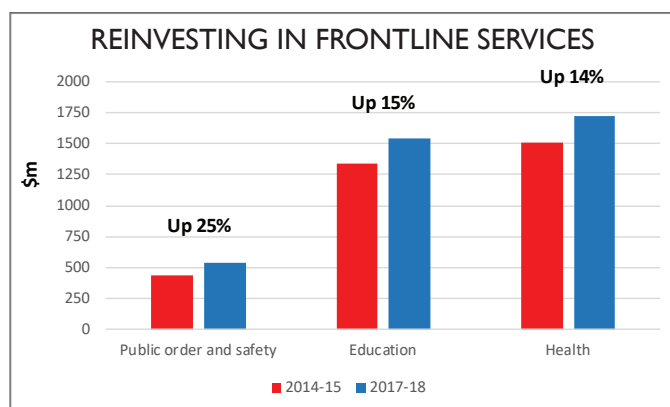

INVESTING IN TASMANIANS

Our goal is to lead the nation in education, create a job-ready generation and give our children the best opportunities possible. To deliver this we are investing a record \$6.36b over four years in education and training. With the Budget now back in balance we're also investing more in essential services which support the broader Tasmanian community.

We will invest \$117m⁺ in better schools and TasTAFE buildings. Funding will upgrade facilities at Austins Ferry, Drysdale, East Devonport, East Launceston, Hobart College, Latrobe, Lenah Valley, Montagu Bay, Parklands, Queechy, Riverside, Smithton, Snug, Somerset, Sorell, St Marys, Tasman District, Windermere, Boat Harbour, Illawarra, Lansdowne Crescent, Molesworth, Southern Support School, Taroona and Spreyton.



\$17.8m to improve student wellbeing - employing additional health nurses in District Schools and additional support staff in government schools such as psychologists, social workers and speech pathologists.

\$3.2m to establish Drysdale as a Centre of Excellence - working with the tourism and hospitality industry and TasTAFE to establish Drysdale as a hub for training and skills development for Tasmania's visitor economy.

Maintained our commitment to \$134m of additional Gonski funding over 6 years.

\$44.8m record support for child protection - providing children with a safe and caring environment is critical to breaking the cycle of neglect and abuse.

JOBS FOR YOUNG TASMANIANS

Tasmania has come a long way in the last three years. Our economy is now forecast to grow at the fastest rate in 10 years, our budget is back in balance, more than 6400 new jobs have been created and our unemployment rate has fallen to 5.8 per cent, around the national average.

The outlook is positive, the Tasmanian economy is expected to grow by 2.5 per cent in 2017-18, which is stronger than the long-term average.

Our long term Plan is working. Together with business and the community we've turned the State around and now we're building Tasmania's future. But there is a long way to go. Along with a good education, every Tasmanian deserves a job which is why we're investing almost \$25m into projects to support 7600 young Tasmanians into jobs, including:

- **\$17.1m in payroll tax relief for businesses which employ apprentices, trainees and young people.** This measure will encourage employers to expand their workforce by taking on young Tasmanians.
- **\$4000 grants to small businesses to support apprentices and trainees.** Taking on a new employee to train can be expensive, this pilot program will support small businesses to expand their number of apprentices.
- **\$4.1m to fund a Jobs Action Package, including the "Jobs Bus".** In partnership with TasCOSS and the TCCI we will remove barriers which limit employment opportunities for young people.
- **A \$600,000 Whitelion Work Ready program** for high risk young people aged between 16-24.
- **\$1.1m Workforce for Now and the Future initiative,** including the Driving for Jobs trial to help young people get a driver's licence by blending driver training with education and vocational training.

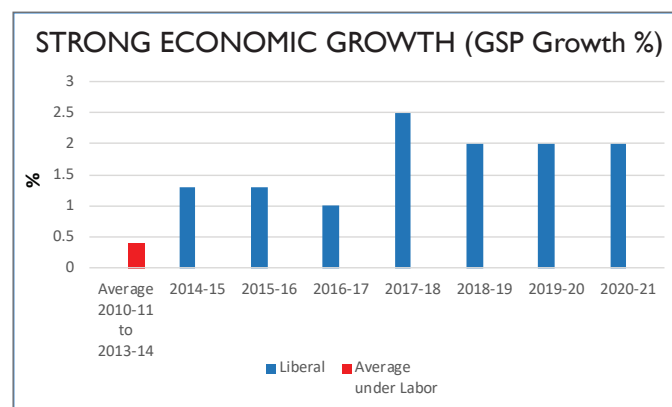

A BALANCED BUDGET EVERY YEAR

The Budget is in surplus by \$54.3m this year and forecast to be in balance for every year across the forward estimates, with a cumulative surplus of just over \$200m. The Government also remains free of net debt, with General Government Net Cash and Investments projected to be \$451.8m as at 30 June 2018.

We're also ensuring the Government continues to live within its means.

For the seven years from when the Hodgman Liberal Government came to office to the end of the Forward Estimates, annual expenditure growth is forecast to be 2.4 per cent, compared with revenue growth of 2.7 per cent.

A balanced budget gives business confidence to invest and employ more people.

Our Budget discipline also means we can invest more in supporting essential services.

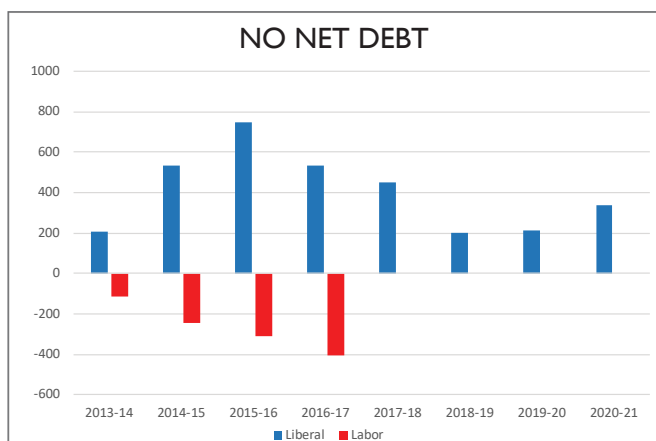


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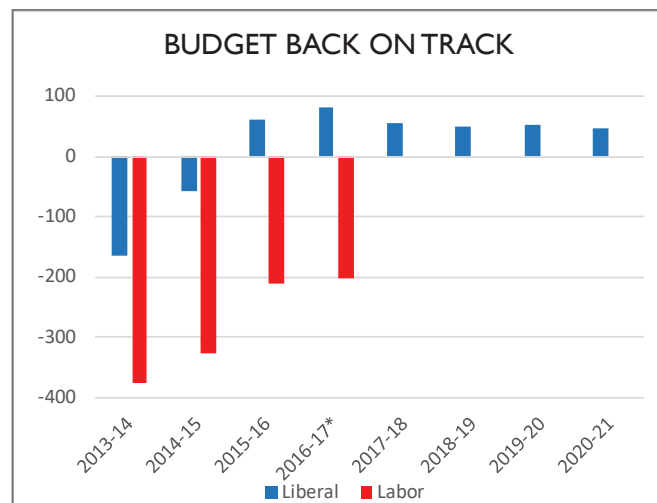


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INFRASTRUCTURE

The Hodgman Liberal Government is building Tasmania's future through investment in important infrastructure across the state.

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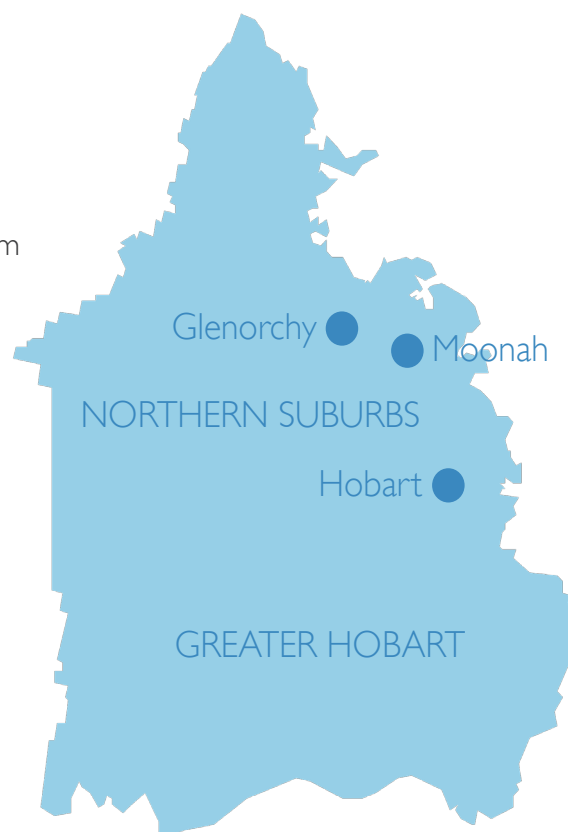
