#### A Message from the Treasurer, Hon. Michael Ferguson MP

Since we have emerged from the pandemic Tasmania's economy has rebounded strongly.

Last financial year, the Tasmanian economy grew by a significant 4.3 per cent. This followed growth of 5 per cent in the 2020-21 year and was stronger than the national growth rate.

It is no surprise that Tasmania has repeatedly been assessed as Australia's best performing economy in the quarterly CommSec State of the States report.

Tasmanian goods exports are at historically high levels and retail trade in March was a staggering 55 per cent higher than when we came to Government.

A strong economy is essential, as it has allowed the Government to invest more into the things Tasmanians care about and need.

It has allowed the Government to increase health, education, housing and community infrastructure investments.

This Budget is focussed on building Tasmania's future, one that is strong, safe and secure. It is carefully considered to deal with real economic headwinds and prepare Tasmania for the future.

The Budget provides for a range of important new initiatives that make key investments in the future of our state, while also caring for and protecting our community.

It includes almost \$5 billion in job-creating infrastructure across the next four years, including \$2.2 billion in new, upgraded roads and bridges across Tasmania.

This Budget will invest a record \$12.1 billion over four years towards vital health services across Tasmania, nearly \$8.3 million each and every day. In addition, there is \$682.9 million over the same period for upgrades and new facilities at hospitals, ambulance stations and mental health centres, as well as strategic investments in our digital health capacity.

This Budget delivers on our landmark reforms to social and affordable housing in Tasmania, providing funding to the new authority, Homes Tasmania, to build homes faster and deliver on our ambitious \$1.5 billion plan to provide 10,000 new homes and units by 2032.

This Budget invests a record \$8.9 billion into education and a further \$305.1 million into schools, education and vocational training infrastructure.

We are continuing our track record of providing a competitive and investment friendly business environment, supporting our industries to grow, invest and employ more Tasmanians.

Through this Budget, we are committed to making Tasmania strong, safe and secure and we are charting a safe path through the economic uncertainties we face.

This is a time when the state needs experience at the helm.

The Rockliff Liberal Government is building Tasmania's future and our Plan is working for our economy and our people.

This Budget strives to keep that momentum.



#### Delivering jobs and a strong, safe economy

Since the Tasmanian Liberal Government came to office in 2014, Tasmania's economy continues to deliver for Tasmanians.



#### The CommSec State of the State

report shows Tasmania has now been ranked first overall for 11 out of the 13 previous quarterly reports and has improved on all eight performance indicators

- The employment rate has almost halved from 7.4% to a record low of 3.8%.
- A record 140,500 women have been employed, 30,000 more than in 2014.
- State Final Demand is 30.6% higher at \$41.6 billion.
- Retail trade is 55% higher at \$710 million.
- The economy has grown 24.5% from the recessionary period in 2013 to \$36.7 billion.
- Wages have increased 25% since 2014.
- This Budget will support more than 20,000 new jobs.



#### Building the infrastructure Tasmania deserves

**\$2.2 billion** for roads and bridges, including **\$522.5 million** to complete the new \$786 million Bridgewater Bridge.

Flexible capital funding for **housing infrastructure** through Homes Tasmania.

**\$682.9 million** for health infrastructure, including digital health infrastructure.

**\$305.1 million** for schools, education and training.

**\$311.7 million** for ICT support and service delivery.

\$375 million for law and order.

**\$557.3 million** for tourism, recreation and culture.



#### Delivering **Health and Mental Wellbeing** services

This Budget continues to deliver the health and mental wellbeing services and quality care, where and when Tasmanians need it.

#### \$12.1 billion

for health expenditure across the Budget and forward estimates:

- More than one third of the entire State Budget operating expenditure - 34.8%
- On average we are spending almost \$8.3 million every day on delivering health services
- That's \$900 million more than last year and we are also investing \$682.9 million for health infrastructure projects.

#### **Better Patient Care**

\$180 million to continue our Digital Health Transformation, with more than \$475 million allocated across the life of the 10-year project. This will change the way patient care is delivered, providing better outcomes for Tasmanians.

To ensure more Tasmanians have access to housing and the housing market.

- Making home ownership more accessible and affordable, through our nation-leading shared equity program - MyHome - helping Tasmanians to buy a home with a deposit as low as two per cent.



## Building our **Education**, **Skills and Workforce Growth** future

The 2023-24 budget continues to build our education capacity ensuring Tasmanians can have access to high quality education, and skills and training, no matter where they live.

#### An extra 940

teachers and educaton staff (full time equivalent) recruited since 2014 with more to come, as well as more TasTAFE teachers to be recruited.

#### Committed to Child Safety

The Tasmanian Government is committed to the implementation of all recommendations from the Commission of Inquiry and has provided **an additional \$30 million** to fund any urgent actions during the 2023-24 year.

#### Strengthening cost of living support

Ensuring Tasmanians can access the support they need for themselves and their families.

## \$347 million for concessions

a record amount to help Tasmanians meet a range of essential services including water, electricity and local council rates. The Tasmanian Government concession program also provides for:

- the Energy Relief Bill Rebate;
- the Private Rental Incentive Scheme;
- the Energy Savers Loan scheme;
- emergency food relief;
- Ticket to Play vouchers; and
- increased student assistance for school levies.

#### Growing our Future

- Delivering Tasmania's Renewable Energy Action Plan and the Tasmanian Renewable Hydrogen Action Plan - partnering with the Australian Government, and industry, to develop Bell Bay as a national green hydrogen hub.
- \$58 million for early works at the Tarraleah power station as part of the Battery of the Nation project.
- More than \$311 million to modernise and support ICT infrastructure service delivery across government departments including Police, Service Tasmania, Justice, and Education.
- More than \$163 million in capital invesment in our national parks including \$58.1 million for the Cradle Mountain Experience Master Plan and \$28.3 million towards our \$40 million investment in Tasmania's Next Iconic Walk at the majestic Tyndall Ranges.
- Transforming our sporting facilities in the North and North-West to support the new Tasmanian AFL and AFLW teams and benefit community sport through:
  - \$65 million towards a \$130 million upgrade of UTAS Stadium at York Park.
  - \$25 million for the Dial Regional Sports Complex; and
  - \$27.5 million for the Northern Suburbs Community Recreation Hub Project in Launceston.
- Investing \$850,000 in our new Tasmanian Salmon Industry Plan to implement key initiatives and provide an enduring framework that articulates long term priorities and supports businesses and the community.
- Providing \$2 million to support sustainability and productivity of abalone stocks through the Abalone Industry Reinvestment Fund.
- \$1 million over two years to support a flathead recovery program to rebuild stocks, undertake research and provide targeted fisher education programs.

There are now **56,000 extra people employed** since the Tasmanian Government came to office in 2014 and the unemployment rate has almost halved.

#### **Job Vacancies**

126.5% higher than before the pandemic began in 2020, presenting greater opportunities for Tasmanians to find a job.

The 2023-24 State Budget supports the creation of more than 20,000 new jobs.

- More than \$667 million into Skills and Workforce Growth, delivering new funding for crucial TasTAFE infrastructure and more support for our Jobs Tasmania agenda.
- Nearly \$120 million over three years committed in new funding for TasTAFE since 2021.
- \$5.5 million in new additional funding for our nation-leading Jobs Hubs.
- \$1.5 million in additional funding as part of the \$6.5 million TasTAFE Freer Farm Agricultural Centre of Excellence project, to ensure the facility has the latest equipment for our students to learn.
- \$3 million for crucial TasTAFE facilities upgrades, including roof, heating and airconditioning at Hobart, Alanvale and Clarence campuses.
- \$1.8 million for the Employer of Choice program, to deliver advisory services for a range of businesses statewide.

## Building up our Economy

It's no surprise that Tasmania has repeatedly been assessed as Australia's strongest performing economy in the quarterly CommSec State of the States report.

The Tasmanian economy has led the nation for 11 of the 13 previous reports - and has improved on all eight of CommSec's indicators since we came to government in 2014.

Tasmania has come forward in leaps and bounds, with record high population, record low unemployment and strong economic growth.

Having a strong economy allows us to invest more into the things Tasmanians care about most - health, education, housing and community infrastructure.

Our approach is certainly working and we can assure Tasmanians that we are not resting on our laurels.

We will continue to do all we can to maintain, and accelerate this momentum.

## Supporting industry for a stronger economy

- \$230 million towards the Government's \$375 million commitment to deliver the Macquarie Point Urban Renewal Precinct.
- **\$3.5 million** to support our Business Energy Efficiency Scheme for large electricity customers.
- \$685,000 for small business sector grants for the Small Business Growth Strategy 2026.
- **\$2 million** for the Agriculture Innovation Fund that deliver benefits to the state's agricultural sector.
- \$1.25 million to underpin the operation of our iconic and treasured West Coast Wilderness Railway, in addition to a \$1 million support package for the region while the railway undergoes critical shutdown.
- \$500,000 to ensure the Boags Visitor Centre experience is a strong tourism drawcard for the north, as well as funding for our world class wukalina Walk.
- \$5 million in partnership with Elphinstone to deliver a new \$25 million, world-class facility that will allow Elphinstone to diversify its export operations and provide opportunities for global defence contracts.
- **\$2.75 million** to help Tasmanian businesses compete and succeed in the national and international defence supply chains.
- \$780,000 over two years to support the Accelerating Trade Program to help more Tasmanian businesses secure trade opportunities, linking them to national and international trade events and missions.
- \$750,000 to deliver client focused services to support our existing major industrial businesses, as well as those seeking to bring their business to Tasmania.




## Growing our Economy

Since we have emerged from the pandemic, Tasmania's economy has rebounded strongly. The decisive action we took has enabled Tasmania to rebuild and recover.

Our response to the pandemic has been significant, with a substantial range of measures that have impacted the Budget. We provided financial assistance to businesses and households, and waived taxes, fees and charges, using our financial strength to cushion our community and businesses from the worst impacts of the downturn that followed.




Growth in Tasmania's economy is expected to be more subdued in the 2022-23 financial year due to the slowing global economy, higher inflation and rising interest rates. The Budget forecasts a continuation of growth in Gross State Product and State Final Demand in 2023-24, with State Final Demand expected to grow above its long-term average.





The benefits of the Tasmanian Liberal Government's plan are flowing through into other economic measures. Our labour market is now booming, with the latest data showing that there are now more than 56,000 extra people employed in Tasmania than when the Government was first elected, and the unemployment rate sits at a record low 3.8 per cent.

Ten years ago there weren't enough jobs for people; today there are jobs looking for people.



Our exports of goods performed strongly throughout the pandemic and remain at historically high levels. Services exports, which were significantly affected by the pandemic, started to rebound following the reopening of borders, including tourism and education services, and will continue to recover strongly over the next two years, driving continued growth in international exports overall.



## Transport Infrastructure projects

Delivering **\$4.3 billion** in Government infrastructure projects and a further \$656.5 million for government businesses and other entities.

- \$522.5 million towards the \$786 million new Bridgewater Bridge.
- \$253 million towards rail infrastructure including the Tasmanian Rail Freight Revitalisation Program, the reconnection of the Bell Bay Line to Wharf, and the Melba Bulk Minerals Rail Hub.
- \$61.3 million to complete the \$565 million 10-Year Midland Highway Action Plan.
- \$52.5 million towards the \$60 million Algona Road Interchange and duplication of the Kingston Bypass.
- \$26.2 million toward the \$75 million for the Launceston and Tamar Valley Traffic Vision including upgrades to Charles Street Bridge and planning for a new Tamar River crossing.

\$87.1 million to continue delivery of the new state-of-the-art health precincts at the North-West Regional Hospital and the Mersey Community Hospital, including a new \$40 million Mental Health Precinct in Burnie and \$57.4 million for the Mersey to deliver a new medical ward and new outpatient clinics, increase bed capacity and upgrade theatre spaces.



- \$30 million for the next stage of the Kingston Community Health Centre.
- **\$21.1 million** to complete the Burnie and Glenorchy Ambulance Station.

### Infrastructure Housing

To support our \$1.5 billion housing program to deliver 10,000 new social and affordable homes by 2032, the 2023-24 Budget supports our nation-leading housing authority, Homes Tasmania, with flexible arrangements to access the funding they need to build more homes faster.

- Provision of \$264 million over four years towards our Community Housing Growth Program and capital housing projects around Tasmania including:
- \$20 million for a new Wintringham facility in Launceston, providing bespoke care for older Tasmanians who have experienced, or are at risk of homelessness.
- \$50 million over four years for 200 innovative homes under our Modular Home Program.

- More than 250 homes across the state through our Community Housing Growth Program.
- **\$22 million** in our new Bethlehem House facility for homeless men in Hobart.
- \$17 million Youth2Indpendence facility in Burnie, providing support to young people aged 16-24
- \$14.8 million for civil works to progress lots release at Huntingfield which will deliver over 460 lots of affordable residential land.

### Infrastructure Keeping Tasmanians Safe

The 2023-24 Budget includes \$375 million over four years in infrastructure upgrades to keep Tasmanians safe, including:

- \$124.2 million to continue the \$270 million Northern Correctional Facility.
- \$46.5 million increasing the total commitment to \$86.5 million to deliver a replacement Burnie Courts Complex in the Burnie CBD.
- \$50 million for a new 52-bed Maximum
   Classification Rated Accommodation Unit, along
   with additional support and training spaces within
   the Risdon Prison Complex.
- \$19.39 million to complete the \$21 million upgrades for Rosebery, Bridgewater and St Helens Police Stations.
- \$17 million to complete the \$85 million new Southern Remand Centre.
- \$3.6 million to replace the Mobile Duress Alarm System and upgrade the security management system at the Risdon Prison Complex.

- **\$6.5 million** to complete the \$24.64 million Large Vessel Replacement Program.
- \$400,000 for Prison Body Scanning Technology in correctional facilities.
- \$10 million to upgrade our volunteer Tasmania Fire Service and State Emergency Service brigades and units around the state.
- **\$6.02 million** for critical infrastructure maintenance at the Risdon Prison Complex.
- \$4.1 million to upgrade the Tasmania Police
   Academy to continue to accommodate
   increasing police recruits as part of Government
   commitments.
- \$1.2 million to continue to upgrade police housing around Tasmania, taking total investment to \$24.1 million.

- **\$60 million** towards a new AFL High Performance Training and Administration Centre to accommoate and support the new Tasmanian AFL team.
- \$65 million towards the \$130 million UTAS Stadium development.
- \$58.1 million for the \$61 million Cradle Mountain Experience.
- **\$28.3 million** towards the \$40 million next iconic multi-day, hut-based walk in the Tyndall Range.
- \$27.5 million to deliver the Northern Suburbs Recreational Hub in Mowbray.
- **\$25** million for the north-west Dial Regional Sports Complex.
- **\$10 million** over two years for the Tasmanian Active Infrastructure Grants Program.

- \$6 million in cycling infrastructure.
- \$8 million for a new Eastern-Shore multi sports facility to be built at Bayview Secondary College.
- \$9.3 million for bus stop upgrades statewide.
- \$11.9 million for the Derwent Ferry Service.
- \$19.34 million for new Park and Ride facilities in the Greater Hobart area.

#### **Delivering better Health Services**

The 2023-24 Budget is a health budget, delivering more beds, staff and initiatives to drive down wait lists.

It continues our record investment in health care, with an **historic investment of \$12.1 billion** over four years to be spent on health, hospitals, community health, mental health and wellbeing. Initiatives include:

- \$196.4 million for the Statewide Elective Surgery Four-Year Plan 2021-2025 to deliver an additional 30,000 elective surgeries over four years.
- \$38 million for endoscopy services to provide an additional 22,000 endoscopy procedures and refurbish and upgrade endoscopy facilities.
- \$20 million to continue the transformation of public outpatient care, reduce waiting times, and provide increased access to evidence-based musculoskeletal care pathways and implement pain and rheumatology care pathways.
- \$41 million years to continue the successful COVID@homeplus and expand the model to develop Virtual Care Hubs and specialised response teams and continuation of the Community Rapid Response Service for hospital-in-the home services.
- \$10 million for public health to support the continued threat of the COVID-19 pandemic and notifiable diseases.
- Over \$1 million for Allied Health Scholarships to provide for an extra 45 Allied Health professionals.
- \$100,000 for the Doctors4Doctors health and wellbeing program.
- \$1.2 million for the Royal Flying Doctor Service to provide oral health care in regional Tasmania.
- \$500,000 to develop a District Hospital masterplan for our 13 rural and regional hospitals and 23 community health centres.

This initiative delivers on a key election commitment to open 298 beds by 2023-24, with a total of 228 beds expected to be open by 30 June 2023, and an additional 70 beds to be open by 30 June 2024.

### **Mental Health and Wellbeing**

- Over \$96 million to support ongoing and significant reform into mental health service delivery, and community wellbeing.
- \$53 million to support the rollout of the Tasmanian Mental Health Reform Program, including GP Practice Liaison, community mental health teams, implementation of the Tasmanian Suicide Prevention Strategy 2023-2027, and workforce development.
- \$24 million to establish and staff the new Tasmanian Eating Disorder Service at St John's Park and funding to progress eating disorder community treatment programs in the North and North-West.
- \$8.6 million for alcohol and other drug residential rehabilitation beds located within community sector organisations around the State.
- \$1.2 million boost for community mental health services including Baptcare, the Butterfly Foundation, and Rural Alive and Well.
- \$930,000 to boost Holyoake's Gottawanna program to deliver counselling and support for those with alcohol and drug addiction.
- \$925,000 over four years for Flourish, Mental Health Family and Friends and the Alcohol, Tobacco and other Drugs Council to support delivery of a new mental health and alcohol and other drugs consumer representative services.

#### **Education, Skills and Workforce Growth**

This Budget builds on our landmark education reforms and invests a record \$8.9 billion into education and a further \$305.1 million into schools, education, and vocational training infrastructure.



- \$36.6 million to increase in-class support through 66 extra positions in 2023, increasing to 100 extra positions in 2025 and through 25 Education Support Specialist positions in 2023.
- \$8.6 million to increase the number of professional support staff available in schools, building on an increase of more than 100 FTE since 2014;
- \$19 million to attract and retain the best and brightest teachers.
- \$15.4 million for more senior leadership roles in targeted areas of need.
- \$305.1 million for infrastructure projects to support future generations with new schools at Brighton and Legana and major redevelopments across the State, including Sorell, Lauderdale and Exeter.
- \$10 million for our Contemporary Classrooms program which is providing students with modern learning spaces
- \$14 million to continue our \$28 million program to construct Six New Child and Family Learning Centres, with East Tamar open, construction well advanced in Waratah-Wynyard and West Ulverstone and Sorell, Kingborough and Glenorchy expected to be complete by the end of next year.
- Facility upgrades including \$7.5 million for the \$8 million electrical switchboards program and \$3.9 million for the \$6.3 million student bathrooms program.
- \$4.4 million for the \$5 million Renewable Energy Schools solar panels program in more than 100 schools.
- \$6.5 million for the Literacy Community wide Framework.

#### **Housing**

This Budget delivers on our landmark reforms for social and affordable housing providing funding to the new authority, Homes Tasmania, to build homes faster and deliver our \$1.5 billion plan to provide 10,000 new homes and units by 2032.

- \$373 million in grant funding to Homes Tasmania to continue to provide housing and homelessness services, deliver new initiatives, and provide funding supports for its capital program.
- \$3 million in additional funding to extend our Residential Land Release Rebate initiative, our Headworks Holiday incentive to bring more land to the market sooner.
- \$4 million over six years for the Build UP Tassie program to support young people aged between 16 and 24 to enter the construction industry and gain skills for life.
- Extending and enhancing our Private Rental Incentive Program with an **additional \$1.5 million** to trial a new and innovative Affordable Rentals Initiative (ARI) allowing Homes Tasmania to secure private rentals at market rate and provide them to eligible low income Tasmanians at a reduced rent.

## **Helping more Tasmanians into home ownership**

- Extending the MyHome Program to give more low-income Tasmanians and first home buyers the opportunity to buy their own home.
- Investing \$30 million into the 'headworks holiday' land release grant program will incentivise private owners to release lots for sale by assisting with the cost of installing the headworks.
- Extending the First Home Owners Grant.
- Providing grants of up to \$10,000 to applicants who construct a new ancillary dwelling and make it available for long-term rent for at least two years.
- Continuing the increased threshold for stamp duty concessions to \$600,000 for Tasmanians buying their first home and pensioners downsizing.



### **Supporting Tasmanians with cost of living**

More than \$347 million in 2023-24, and across the Forward Estimates, in concessions for vulnerable Tasmanians to help them to meet a range of essential costs such as water, electricity and local council rates.



Concessions to support Tasmanians have increased in value by **more than 13%** for essentials including water, electricity, rates, school fees and transport.

 \$261.5 million over the next four years to assist eligible Tasmanians to manage their electricity bills, including the \$45 million Energy Bill Relief Rebate.

## **Energy Price Relief Rebate supports up to:**



- 140,000 households
- 35,000 small businesses
- \$40.6 million over four years in concessions for water and sewerage bills, where eligible pensioners and those on low incomes received a concession of up to \$226.66 in the 2023-24 year. This concession is indexed annually to Hobart CPI.
