# **Education, Skills and Training**

Securing Tasmania's Future • Delivering Our Plan



Now more than ever it is vital that we secure Tasmania's future. That we secure the education, skills and training Tasmanians need to grasp the opportunities ahead. The 2021-22 Tasmanian Budget invests a record \$8 billion to support Tasmanians to get the education, training and skills they need to secure a job and their future.

### DELIVERING BETTER EDUCATION FOR TASMANIAN STUDENTS

- \$56M for disability funding to support students and to meet learner needs\*
- \$3.9M for the Education Workforce roundtable including the Teacher Intern Placement Program initiative\*
- \$5.3M to increase school quality literacy coaches to 40 commencing in 2022\*
- \$1M to extend the 24 Carrot Gardens Project to additional three high schools and two primary schools\*
- \$7M to renew and upgrade outdated classrooms statewide\*
- \$4.7M to build an online assessment platform for senior secondary assessments and exams\*
- \$3.8M to provide free access to speech pathologists, psychologists and social workers in family learning centres\*
- \$3.75M for a new renewable energy schools program to rollout solar panels in over 100 Government schools\*
- \$5.36M to employ an additional 11.4 full time Grade 4 School Health Nurses and 3 full time Grade Clinical Nurse Educators\*
- \$750,000 for the new Stay ChatTY in schools program<sup>#</sup>
- \$6M to assist and support students who are impacted by trauma and help with behavioural challenges\*
- \$2M to rollout a new professional development program in trauma for school leaders, teachers and teacher assistants<sup>^</sup>
- \$320,000 to roll out the free sanitary items in Government schools\*
- \$250,000 to provide online professional learning for the Wellbeing Lead Teacher and Principal in every Government school
- \$15,000 for school health nurses to undertake specialised training in Youth Mental Health First aid
- Finalise the commitment for all 57 Tasmanian High Schools offering Year 11 and 12 by 2022

- \$8M towards a new multi-sports facility to be built at Bayview Secondary College in Rokeby<sup>#</sup>

### Securing Tasmania's Future • Delivering Our Plan

Now more than ever it is vital that we secure Tasmania's future. That we secure the health and safety of our community. The 2021-22 Tasmanian Budget increases investment in health to a record \$10.7 billion. This additional funding will make a significant difference to our health system, and the health and wellbeing of Tasmanians.

## DELIVERING BETTER HEALTH, MENTAL HEALTH AND PREVENTATIVE HEALTH SERVICES IN HOSPITAL, IN THE COMMUNITY AND IN THE HOME

- \$160M for additional elective surgeries and endoscopies supported by more than 180 additional health staff statewide\*
- \$15.7M to implement the Health Workforce 2040 Strategy which includes recruitment, training, re-training and postgraduate training and recruitment processes\*
- \$40.8M to recruit more paramedics state-wide including an additional crew in Launceston\*
- \$27.5M for community-based health care, including hospital-inthe-home services and other health care delivered in the home or community\*
- \$8M to support better GP after-hours access and reduce pressure on emergency departments\*
- \$18.3M to increase staffing in Tasmania's District Hospitals as part of the safe staffing model\*
- \$5M to further support and encourage positive work environments with a Positive Health Culture program\*
- \$198M to meet increasing demand in hospitals and support opening beds\*
- \$50M to fully fund phases one and two of our Child and Adolescent Mental Health Service reforms and continue the broader roll out of the Tasmanian Mental Health Reform Program\*
- \$14M for additional paramedic crews in Hobart and Launceston\*
- \$2M to amend the Controlled Access Scheme and enable improved access to Medicinal Cannabis\*
- Over \$9.4M for ill-health prevention and community-based wellbeing programs\*
- \$2.2M to meet increasing demand for community mental health services<sup>^</sup>
- \$1.4M for Community Transport Services to support Tasmanians to access care\*

- \$7.8M to continue and expand COVID-introduced mental health services, including a mental health phone triage service and increased capacity for Rural Alive and Well<sup>^</sup>
- \$5.1M to pilot an innovative Emergency Mental Health Co-Response Model<sup>^</sup>
- Additional \$4M for the next Healthy Tasmania Strategy<sup>\*</sup>
- \$18M for new public-private partnerships to deliver health care sooner
- \$20M for the Hospital Equipment Fund to replace and upgrade critical hospital equipment<sup>#</sup>
- \$1M for the Hospital Avoidance Co-investment Fund
- \$10.5M to strengthen in-home and community-based Palliative Care services\*
- \$4.25M for Palliative Care Tasmania to educate and train GPs, community education and workforce development\*

- \$8.5M for the Mental Health Hospital in the Home Pilot in the North-West<sup>^</sup>
- \$4.3M to establish a new Rural Medical Workforce Centre at the Mersey Community Hospital\*

- \$12M to commence Launceston General Hospital redevelopment Stage 2 – Mental Health Precinct\*
- \$20M for the North West Regional Hospital Mental Health Precinct<sup>#</sup>
- \$2.5M for ward upgrades and additional bed capacity at North-West Regional Hospital<sup>^</sup>
- \$8.1M for the North West Regional Hospital to fully operate a second linear accelerator\*
- \$110M for the Royal Hobart Hospital expanded stage 2 redevelopment<sup>^</sup>

- \$9M for new ambulance vehicles and equipment<sup>#</sup>
- \$600,000 towards new helipads in Dover and St Helens
- \$10M towards Stage 2 of the Kingston Health Centre<sup>^</sup>
- \$10M towards the expanded redevelopment of the Mersey Community Hospital<sup>#</sup>
- \$3.5M to upgrade the Midlands Multipurpose Health Centre upgrade
- \$15M to commence the Health ICT Digital Transformation project
