Taking Action on the cost of living and providing more housing options for Tasmanians

In the next 100 days we will:

- Establish the model for delivering the Government's nation-leading Modular Finance Guarantee to unlock access to finance for modular housing, unlocking faster, cheaper housing.
- Progress legislation to boost the First Home Owner Grant to \$20,000 to incentivise first home construction and help Tasmanians into their first home.
- Commence the new free Meningococcal B vaccine program for infants in Tasmania.
- Deliver on our election commitment to establish Building Standards Tasmania as a dedicated body to give consumers and industry greater confidence in the application of building compliance, standards and regulation.
- Pass legislation to implement the Government's crackdown on dodgy builders and company phoenixing.
- Following community input, release the preferred pathway for increased childcare in the Dorset region and the new supersized Child and Family Learning Centre at Scottsdale.
- Commence construction of Early Learning for Three Year Olds at sites at Zeehan and East Devonport Primary Schools, with the East Devonport facility to also support Outside School Hours Care for families in the North-West.
- Deliver Libraries Tasmania's Winter School Holiday program, providing families with free, fun things to do at local libraries across the State.
- Establish a "tackle box" program to encourage Tasmanian kids to participate in recreational sea fishing.
- Launch the third year of the junior fee waiver program, an initiative to support participation and our next generation of anglers.
- Release the Tasmanian Government Concessions and Discount guide, providing cost of living relief, subsidies and discounts to help ease cost of living pressures for Tasmanians.
- Bring the Tasmanian Planning Policies into effect, creating the first set of common policies applying statewide to Tasmania's planning system, shaping the regional land use strategies and the Tasmanian Planning Scheme.
- Commence the first full year of free bus and ferry travel as a key cost of living measure.
- Conclude consultation on increasing the size of granny flats and begin statutory consideration and reporting process on feedback.
- Continue to deliver more social and affordable homes in the next 100 days, in line with our commitment to deliver 10,000 social and affordable homes by 2032.
- Debate in the Parliament the Land Use Planning and Approvals (Miscellaneous Amendments) Bill to streamline assessment processes and improve development assessment processes.
- Debate the Housing Land Supply Amendment Bill in the Parliament, making it easier and faster to deliver land for social and affordable housing.
- Declare the Southern Tasmania Regional Land Use Strategy, managing land use change and supporting growth and the release of land for housing.
- Reach practical completion of 16 additional modular units and deliver a further 24 modular units to sites across Tasmania through the Government's successful ModHomes Program.
- Establish a Project Team within Building Tasmania to plan and manage the transfer of land at Dowsing Point unlocking 1000 new homes.

- Establish Building Tasmania to lead an integrated approach to the delivery of infrastructure and housing in Government.
- Negotiate the Federation Funding Agreement (FFA) with the Australian Government to deliver the Federal Kit of Parts building initiative in Tasmania, helping to deliver more homes, faster.
- Table the Housing Land supply Order for 2 hectares of land at Penguin, enabling approximately 45 lots.
- Table the Housing land Supply Order for 2.7 hectares of land at Ravenswood, allowing for approximately 25 lots.
- Undertake targeted consultation on a new Apartment Code which will promote and facilitate multi-storey apartments in appropriate locations.

Building an even better health system

In the next 100 days we will:

- Announce the successful recipients of the grant program to allow community pharmacies to open for longer, including evenings and weekends.
- Appoint the vendor to deliver Tasmania's first Electronic Medical Record under the Digital Health Transformation Project, allowing real-time recording of medical records and information sharing across primary and aged care sectors for better patient outcomes.
- Begin construction of the new \$120 million Launceston Heart Centre.
- Begin the Government's new \$5 million IVF subsidy, assisting Tasmanian women with the cost of fertility services.
- Commence local working groups as part of broader community consultation on the \$15 million Health and Mental Health Hub in the Huon Valley, delivering more bulk-billed GP services to the region.
- Announce the location for the final TassieDoc clinic in Southern Tasmania and begin an Expression of Interest process for more bulk billed GP services for Bridport.
- First Tasmanian GPs begin assessing, diagnosing and initiating the prescription of medication for children and adults with ADHD.
- Launch Tasmania's first Virtual Emergency Department to support Tasmanians and relieve pressure on our ED's.
- Open applications to increase employment opportunities for Nurse Practitioners by incentivising private practices to grow their workforce, especially in rural and regional areas.
- Release an Expression of Interest on the future use of the James Scott Wing of the Scottsdale Memorial Hospital.
- Release an Expression of Interest process for Government-owned greenfield sites for the construction of new aged care and assisted living facilities in each region.
- Start construction of the new 27-bed Adult Mental Health and Eating Disorder Treatment Centre at St John's Park.
- Submit the Development Application and release concept designs for Stage 2 of the Kingston Community Health Centre, increasing community health services in the region.
- Welcome first students to the restored Graduate Diploma of Midwifery at the University of Tasmania, in line with the Government's Midwifery Workforce Strategy and following Tasmanian Government funding support.



Delivering our Strong Plan for a Stronger Economy

In the next 100 days we will:

- Hold the inaugural legislative repeal day for 2026 in the August-September session, reducing red tape and ridding the Statutes of unnecessary laws.
- Announce the preferred tenderer to repurpose the Treasury building.
- Announced the preferred tenderer for the digitisation of the State's liquor licensing system.
- Begin monthly public Budget reporting in line with the continuation of monthly State Service FTE reporting.
- Commence early works at Macquarie Point to support the new Multipurpose Stadium.
- Complete stakeholder consultation on the next phase of the review of Treasury's Prequalification Scheme, to ensure the scope of the scheme continues to meet the needs of government and industry.
- Debate the Tax Miscellaneous Amendment Bill in the Parliament.
- Deliver responsible changes to the State financial management system to cut red tape and improve responsiveness to community need.
- Finalise preferred pathway to establish a Tasmanian Government Supplier Portal
- Formalise arrangements with TasNetworks to shield existing direct transmission connected customers from the transmission cost impacts of Project Marinus.
- Finalise the draft Bill on the proposed new liquor licensing framework.
- Enhance the quarterly government procurement statistics providing greater transparency and detail about the success of Tasmanian businesses when competing for government contracts under the Buy Local Policy.
- Introduce the Tranche 2 Government Business governance reform legislation.
- Advance negotiations with the Australian Government on a new single touch Tasmanian environmental assessment and approvals agreement to reduce duplication and support timely project approvals for major developments.
- Commence the staged investment in the Westbury BioHub Project, subject to due diligence, to support the future conversion of up to 36,000 tonnes of organic waste into renewable biomethane and regional employment.
- Provide the Federal Government with Tasmania's expectations for a National Environmental Standard for Environmental Offsets which recognises Tasmania's nation-leading reserve system.
- Deliver the 2026 Tasmanian Export Awards, recognising Tasmania's leading exporters and supporting their progression to the national awards program.
- Finalise the selection and appointment of Trade Advocates in the United States and Japan, to help expand Tasmania's international market presence, support export growth, attract trade and investment opportunities and help Tasmanian businesses respond to emerging international market challenges and opportunities.
- Open the Threatened Species Fund Strategic Partnership Program to coincide with National Threatened Species Day.
- Invest up to \$1 million in the redevelopment of Southern Waste Solutions' Copping and Lutana sites to enable advanced waste recovery, clean energy generation and high value soil products, with strong industry co-investment.
- Release the draft long-term Small Business Growth Strategy for public consultation.
- Award the tender for the construction of the AFL High Performance Centre.

- Continue to open the school gates, providing communities and sporting groups with access to school sports facilities, including facilitating AFL Tasmania's Launceston Auskick School Holiday Programs.
- Deliver an expanded Power People program through Aurora Energy and TasNetworks, supporting energy literacy in our communities and delivering on our Climate Change Action Plan.
- Hydro Tasmania to complete the \$35.5 million upgrade works at the Edgar Dam, delivering improved reliability and safety.
- Reduce red tape by removing paper certificates of title, making property transactions quicker, simpler and more secure.
- Release a draft Tasmanian Statement of Expectations for Data Centres and AI Infrastructure for consultation.
- Award next round of the 26TEN Workplace Grants, to help Tasmanians build the literacy and numeracy skills needed to thrive at work.
- Commence actioning priority areas of red tape reduction identified through the Audit of Tasmanian State and Local Government Licences, permits and approvals.
- Commence modernisation of Forest Practices Regulations to identify areas for improvement and efficiency including consultation with private landowners.
- Convene an industry, community education and training leaders Summit, in partnership with the TCCI, to prioritise actions to boost productivity and lift workforce participation.
- Launch a new public-facing dashboard with information on the pipeline of investments facilitated by the Office of Coordinator-General.
- Launch the AI accelerator program to improve efficiency and productivity across government, while reducing the regulatory and administration burden.
- Release a new Skills Compact between Government and industry to address workforce issues in the aged care sector and grow the supply of skilled workers.
- Announce recipients of Arts grants, including the Aboriginal Arts Program, low-interest loans, the Tasmanian Aboriginal Arts Mentoring Scheme, Artsbridge and the Young and Emergency Artist Professional Development Program.
- Announce recipients of the \$250,000 Electric Vehicle Charging Grant Program to expand charging infrastructure at tourism businesses across the State.
- Deliver a new \$2.55 million, three-year funding agreement for the Tasmanian Hospitality and Tourism Academy and Hospitality Tasmania.
- Host a second industry roundtable in August to progress a shared long-term vision for the West Coast Wilderness Railway.
- Launch the 2030 and Beyond – Visitor Economy Action Plan – developed in partnership with industry to set the next stage of the 2030 Visitor Economy Strategy
- Launch the Cruise shipping Action Plan outlining the Government's approach to the cruise market aligned to the 2040 Access Strategy and Visitor Economy Strategy.
- Launch the Off Season campaign takeover of the Martin Place high-traffic pedestrian link in Sydney.
- Release outcomes for Tasmania's economy from the 2026 Dark MOFO festival.
- Support industry operators to leverage international market opportunity through the ATEC Trade Ready program subsidy
- Support the 10th anniversary of the Beaker Street Festival, celebrating science, culture and community.
- Support the inaugural Island Escape Winter Festival in Launceston's Inveresk Precinct, celebrating Tasmania's music, food, art and winter spirit.
- Support TT-Line and the new Spirits of Tasmania with pre-launch conversion activity and initiate market support through Tourism Tasmania.



- Welcome hundreds of participants and visitors for the 2026 Australian Transplant Games in Launceston – the first time in its 40-year history the event has been held in Tasmania.
- Commence the Year 8 education pilot with the Beacon Foundation in selected schools.
- Continue to build the Vocational Education and Training (VET) workforce, with the next group of future trainers to commence Certificate IV in Training and Assessment, a key part of our plan to address a shortage of VET trainers.
- Deliver Family Phonics Kits to schools to support early literacy at home.
- Open applications for Change2Teaching ahead of pilot commencing in 2027 – a new teaching qualification pathway by attracting mid-career professionals from other industries.
- Progress our new \$2.5 million Agriculture Learning Centre at Scottsdale High School by beginning procurement of an architect.
- Reduce teacher and staff workloads and duplicated processes with procurement of the new Student and School Management System, including commencing planning for the roll-out in conjunction with staff.
- Through IMAS, collect initial broodstock for Sand Flathead stock enhancement program.
- Commence stakeholder consultation on reducing red tape for fishers through changes to fisheries regulations.
- Commence the Ag Career Coach program delivered by TasFarmers to connect young Tasmanians with careers in agriculture.
- Commission the Northern Midlands Irrigation Scheme.
- Commence the modernisation of the Anzac Day Observance Act 1929, to ensure legislation is fit for purpose and reduces red tape for business.
- Commence the roll-out of more drought resilience activities under phase 2 of the Farm Business Resilience Program.
- Hold the second peak industry roundtable for the development of the Tasmania's new long-term Agriculture Strategy.
- Work with the Commonwealth, states and jurisdictions to research the development of new biocide and biocontrol viruses and protocols for rabbit control.
- Reduce red tape for impacted farmers through implementation of a new Framework to manage former GM canola sites.
- Release the Tasmanian Varroa Mite Response Plan for public consultation to strengthen Tasmania's biosecurity preparedness and protect the State from pests and diseases.
- Deliver practical actions to make insurance cheaper, fairer and more accessible for Tasmanians through TasInsure, including establishing formal industry arrangements, delivering hard-to-place insurance and progressing improved access to insurance for those not currently served by the market.
- Launch the Premier's Reading Challenge to lift literacy and encourage a love of reading for young Tasmanians of all ages.
- Open the Expression of Interest for Targeted and Negotiated Voluntary Redundancies for the State Service.
- Complete the new Spirit of Tasmania gantry, including loading systems.
- Complete the new Spirit of Tasmania terminal building at Berth 3 in Devonport.
- Undertake testing at Berth 3 in Devonport as the new Spirit of Tasmania vessels arrive in the Mersey.

Supporting our Communities

In the next 100 days we will:

- Launch a Waste and Resources Recovery scholarship and education pathway to build long-term sector capability in Tasmania.
- Begin preliminary consultation on the new adult minimum security prison when the Ashley Youth Detention Centre site is vacated.
- Complete earth and piling works on the site of the new Burnie Court.
- Deliver an additional Recycle Rewards refund point in Greater Hobart by the end of September, to boost network capacity and give Tasmanians extra opportunity to return their containers.
- Introduce and debate legislation to stop the inappropriate use of good character references by offenders in relation to serious offences, including sexual offences.
- Implement recommendations of the independent review into the Neighbourhood Disputes about Plants scheme.
- Introduce legislation to prohibit the use of terrorist symbols and to protect places or worship.
- Introduce the Commission of Inquiry (Misc Amendments) Bill 2026, implementing more recommendations from the Inquiry to protect Tasmanian children.
- Introduce the Government's Post and Boast laws to parliament.
- Receive the report of Lloyd Babb SC on fixing court backlogs.
- Release draft legislation for public consultation to implement the first tranche of legislative reforms to strengthen responses to family violence.
- Release draft legislation to implement Workplace Protection Orders in Tasmania.
- Complete and open the new Western Stand at the UTAS stadium in Launceston.
- Announce the successful applications of the inaugural women sporting grant program, Her Path to Play.
- Complete the \$1.1 million improvements to visitor access at the Cockle Creek campgrounds, the gateway to the Southwest National Park.
- Complete the \$1.65 million upgrades at Tasmans Arch and Devils Kitchen, on the Tasman Peninsula.
- Lay a new, elite level sports floor at the Silverdome as part of the \$12 million upgrades, and install a new video cube, delivering a superior fan experience.
- Officially open the High-Performance Training Centre for the JackJumpers and Jewels at Kingborough.
- Celebrate the opening of the new indoor swimming pool in the Southern Beaches, following the Government's investment of \$1.5 million in Luke Doerner's vision for this important community infrastructure.
- Release the final Bay of Fires Masterplan – delivering an environmentally, economically and socially sustainable Bay of Fires experience for the next 20 years.
- Unveil the inaugural Tasmanian WNBL team, The Jewels, ahead of the start of the 2026-27 season.
- Finalise the development and testing of the Parks Online Booking System – for the upcoming launch - enabling visitors to book campsites and other Parks products in one seamless experience.
- Begin the 12-month trial of tasers for up to 50 frontline Tasmania Police officers trained in their use.
- Officially launch Tasmania Police's new Online Crime Reporting Portal.
- Pilot an online reporting portal for sexual violence.
- Announce recipients of the 2025-26 Social Cohesion Grants program, funding community projects that foster social cohesion and address racism and anti-social behaviour.



- Welcome up to 37 new recruits to Tasmania Police at graduation ceremonies.
- Announce recipients of the Tasmanian Men's Sheds Capital Investment Grants program.
- Appoint members to the inaugural Multicultural Ministerial Advisory Council.
- Complete our \$10 million Outdoor Learning Areas program, delivering over 140 enhanced outdoor learning spaces to schools across Tasmania.
- Release the Tasmanian Disability Inclusion Plan.
- Gazette and implement the Animal Welfare (Dogs) Regulations, delivering stronger protections and welfare outcomes for dogs in Tasmania.
- Launch the third round of the annual tagged trout program to boost participation and encourage fishers to explore different waters across the State.
- Open the annual Cameron Baird VC MG Scholarship Applications.
- Open the annual Teddy Sheean VC Memorial Grant Program applications.
- Begin works on the Westbound Westbury Heavy Vehicle Rest Area.
- Commence public consultation on Arthur Highway priority projects.
- Complete the Claremont Park and Ride facility.
- Complete the Olinda Grove traffic signals that activate when queuing is detected on the Southern Outlet off-ramp.
- Release the options for assessment for St Mary's Pass upgrades.
- Release the tender for the South Arm Highway–Acton Road intersection Signalisation upgrade.
- Release the tender for the West Tamar Highway–Ecclestone Road and River Road Intersection upgrades.
- Table the Local Government Electoral Bill 2026 to deliver a new and more flexible framework for local government elections.
