#### A Message from the Treasurer, Hon. Michael Ferguson MP

For nine consecutive quarters the Tasmanian economy has led the nation in the CommSec State of the State Reports, holding the mantle of the best-performing economy and ranking highly in the key economic indicators.

Tasmanian exports are at record highs, retail trade in March was a staggering 45.4 per cent higher than when we came to Government, and in 2020-21 our economy experienced more than double the growth of the national economy.

Treasury forecasts that above-average economic growth will continue in 2022-23 and 2023-24.

Having a strong economy is essential, as it has allowed the Government to invest more into the things Tasmanians care about.

It has allowed the Government to increase investment in health, education, housing and community infrastructure.

And, it has allowed us to deliver on our commitments.

The 2022-23 State Budget is about strengthening our future. It builds on the gains already made and focuses on delivering for all Tasmanians.

It includes a landmark \$5.6 billion to continue building the infrastructure our communities need and deserve for generations to come.

It increases health expenditure to a third of the entire Budget, with \$11.2 billion across the Budget and Forward Estimates, including funding for contemporary health infrastructure to enhance care and service delivery.

It provides \$538 million for housing over the next four years, which is part of our record \$1.5 billion over 10 years to build 10,000 new homes for Tasmanians. <image>

This Budget sees funding for education, skills and training grow to a record \$8.5 billion, including bolstering our education workforce, and substantial funding to keep our children safe.

We will continue our ambitious plans in renewable energy, which will unlock significant economic and environmental benefits, and support industries that help to underpin the Tasmanian economy and take our products and brand to the world.

This year we are also releasing the Tasmanian Government's first Gender Budget Statement. The Gender Budget Statement highlights how the Budget will target areas of inequality for the Tasmanian community.

This Budget balances support to help Tasmanians who need it most, maintaining our strong pace of delivery, and investing to strengthen Tasmania's future.

#### Strengthening jobs and our economy

Since the Tasmanian Liberal Government came to office in 2014, Tasmania's economy has gone from strength to strength.

CommSec's State of the State report has shown that Tasmania's economy has led the nation for the past nine consecutive quarters.



#### Strengthening Child Safety

- The Tasmanian Government will implement all recommendations from the Commission of Inquiry and is acting now to deliver additional initiatives to help safeguard children.
- The 2022-23 Budget includes an additional \$36.4 million, including new school safeguarding officers in every Tasmanian Government school, additional support for students impacted by trauma, and \$15.1 million for new multi-disciplinary sexual violence support pilots.

#### Strengthening cost of living support

#### Strengthening our Future

- Substantial investment into Tasmania's Renewable Energy future, with an historic Commonwealth and Tasmanian Government partnership to deliver Marinus Link, including \$58 million for early works at the Tarraleah power station.
- Investment in new and existing tourism icons, and our National Parks of \$144 million as well as \$84.7 million towards upgrades of the Great Eastern Drive and an additional \$12 million to secure Tasmania's visitor economy.
- Over \$297 million to modernise ICT infrastructure across Police, Service Tasmania, Justice, Education and improve cyber security across Government and Health.
- **\$60 million** to transform Tasmania's sporting facilities across the State, including Dial Regional Sports complex, the Northern Suburbs multi-sports facility, feasibility of a new AFL stadium in southern Tasmania and development of a 10-year Stadium Plan.

## **Jobs for Tasmanians**

There are 26,000 more people in employment since the majority Liberal Government came to office in 2014 and the unemployment rate has halved.

- \$18 million to provide low or no fee training places for job seekers.
- \$7.9 million to operate our four new Local Jobs Hubs in communities across Tasmania.

### Strengthening our Economy

For nine consecutive quarters the Tasmanian economy has led the nation in the CommSec State of the State Reports.

In 2020-21, Tasmania's economy grew by 3.8 per cent in the year – the second strongest growth recorded by all jurisdictions and more than double the growth experienced by the national economy. In 2021-22, the economy is expected to grow by 3<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> per cent, well above the long-term average, and Treasury forecasts that above-average economic growth will continue in 2022-23 and 2023-24. Tasmanian goods exports are at record highs, growing by almost 25 per cent to reach \$4.6 billion in the 12 months to March 2022. Retail trade was \$665.9 million in March, 15.3 per cent higher than before the pandemic and a staggering 45.4 per cent higher than when we came to Government.

Having a strong economy has allowed the Government to invest more in the things Tasmanians care about. It has allowed the Government to increase investment in health, education, housing and community facilities.



### Strengthening our Economy


Two years ago, our world faced challenges and uncertainties as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, which caused significant economic disruption, impacting the way we work, socialise and do business.

We took swift action in response to the pandemic with our social and economic support measures, with over \$1 billion in support measures. This decisive action has enabled Tasmania to rebuild and recover, as we transition to living with COVID-19.



Tasmania was in a position of strength before the pandemic, and with our successful management of the virus the Tasmanian economy is now rebounding strongly. In the December 2021 quarter, Tasmania's State Final Demand experienced the second highest growth rate in Australia at 5.8 per cent.


Similarly, Tasmania's Gross State Product grew by 3.8 per cent in 2020-21 to \$34.8 billion, which is the fastest growth in 13 years. This growth has been underpinned by thriving private investment, household consumption, together with the Government's investment in social and economic infrastructure.


The benefits of this economic resurgence are being seen in our employment market – after the worst drop in employment in recent memory, jobs have now recovered to the pre-pandemic level.

The latest ABS data shows that the Tasmanian unemployment rate has now dropped to 3.8 per cent in April 2022, the lowest level on record and half of what it was when the Government was elected in 2014.



The strength and confidence in our economy is clearly demonstrated by solid consumer confidence. Retail trade has rebounded with total turnover in April reaching \$665.9 million, which is more than 15 per cent higher than before the pandemic.

Tasmanian exports are also booming, at a record \$4.6 billion in the year to March 2022, which is 24.5 per cent higher than the year before and over 66 per cent above the level when the Tasmanian Liberal Government was first elected in 2014.

The 2022-23 Budget includes \$250 million over four years for new and upgraded schools and educational facilities across the State, including:

- **\$1.6 million** for the Bothwell District School (Agriculture in Schools) upgrade;
- **\$15.1 million** for major development at Cambridge Primary School;
- **\$2 million** for the Campbell Town District School (Agriculture in Schools) upgrade;
- **\$7 million** to continue the \$10 million contemporary classrooms program across the State;
- \$11 million for the Exeter High School major redevelopment;
- **\$14 million** for the \$21.6 million for the Hobart City Partners School Project;
- \$6.4 million for the Lauderdale Primary School redevelopment;
- **\$22 million** to continue the \$24 million new Legana Primary School;
- **\$7.1 million** for the Montello Primary School redevelopment;
- **\$46.1 million** to continue the \$50 million new Brighton High School;
- **\$5 million** to finalise the \$20 million Kindergarten to Year 12 Penguin School;
- **\$18.5 million** to continue the \$22 million new Kindergarten to Year 12 Sorell School;

- \$10 million investment in outdoor learning areas;
- **\$4 million** to continue the \$5 million Renewable Energy Schools Program;
- **\$19 million** for the revitalisation of Cosgrove High School;

- \$23.8 million to continue the \$28 million investment for six new Child and Family Learning Centres;
- \$1.3 million to complete the \$1.5 million Springfield Gardens Primary School extension;

- \$5.2 million for the \$6.3 million Supporting Safer Schools and Safer Bathrooms program; and

#### Infrastructure Housing

The 2022-23 Budget includes a record \$538 million over the next four years as part of a massive \$1.5 billion investment over 10 years to support Tasmanians to get into a home faster.

#### It includes:

- **\$86.5 million** to continue the \$100 million Community Housing Growth Program;
- **\$141 million** for the \$280 million extended Social Housing Build, which will build 2 000 new homes by 2027, in addition to the 1,500 to be built by June 2023 from existing programs;
- **\$231 million** for Housing Tasmania's new housing program;
- **\$16 million** for Supported Accommodation Facilities in the North and North West;
- \$25.6 million to complete the delivery of Tasmania's \$125 million Affordable Housing Action Plan; and
- **\$35 million** to commence the new Housing Package as part of the Government's \$1.5 billion commitment to deliver 10,000 new social and affordable homes by 2032.

### Infrastructure Keeping Tasmanian Safe

The 2022-23 Budget includes \$222.9 million over four years in infrastructure upgrades to keep Tasmanians safe, including:

- **\$37.5 million** to continue the \$40 million Burnie Court complex;
- **\$90.7 million** to continue the \$270 million Northern Correctional Facility;
- **\$17 million** to complete the \$85 million new Southern Remand Centre;
- \$1.3 million for Prison Body Scanning Technology in correctional facilities;
- \$3.7 million to uplift forensic science technology;
- **\$3.3 million** for two new sites to house the new multidisciplinary centres for sexual and family violence victim-survivors;
- **\$8 million** for critical infrastructure maintenance at Risdon Prison;
- \$6.2 million for the Automatic Vehicle Location upgrade project;

- **\$460,000** to continue Unmanned Aerial Vehicles (drones) to reduce anti-social driving;
- \$27 million for upgraded Police Stations at Rosebery, Bridgewater, Launceston and St Helens;
- **\$8.1 million** to complete the \$12 million Sorell Emergency Services Hub;
- **\$950,000** to complete the \$3.6 million for a standalone facility for the Special Operations Group (SOG) in the South;
- \$10.3 million to complete the \$24.6 million large offshore police patrol vessel to replace the PV Van Diemen;
- **\$3.3 million** to continue the \$21.7 million upgrade of police housing in regional communities; and
- **\$1.8 million** for volunteer fire brigade equipment upgrades.

#### Infrastructure Community, Transport and Sport

The 2022-23 Budget includes a significant investment into community infrastructure, including public transport, sporting facilities and cycling infrastructure, National Parks, gardens and camping facilities, museums and recreational boating infrastructure, including –

- **\$18.9 million** for ongoing funding for the Hobart to Bellerive Service including infrastructure;
- \$8.3 million to continue the \$10 million bus stop upgrade program;
- **\$3 million** to continue the \$6 million for cycling infrastructure;
- **\$17.3 million** for the \$20 million new Park and Ride facilities to boost public transport use;
- **\$4 million** for scoping and design of a Hobart Transit Centre as part of the Greater Hobart Traffic Solution;
- \$25 million for the Dial Regional Sports Complex;
- \$33.5 million towards the Northern Suburbs multi-sports facility;
- **\$1.25 million** for AFL Team Task Force and Stadium feasibility study;
- \$750,000 Premier's Fund for Children and Young People to deliver recreational facilities and programs around the State;
- \$3 million to continue the delivery of contemporary library resources;

- \$3.4 million for the Glen Dhu pool; and
- **\$400,000** for the St Helens Pump Track.
- **\$144 million** for National Park restoration, upgrades and maintenance, including:
  - \$2.9 million for Cockle Creek camping and access upgrade;
  - \$1.5 million for Tasman Arch and Devils Kitchen revitalisation;
  - \$2.3 million towards the \$2.8 million Tamar Island Wetlands Boardwalk replacement;
  - \$825,000 for Flinders Island camping upgrades and RV access;
  - \$18.7 million for the \$40 million Next Iconic Walk project in the Tyndall Range;
  - \$3 million for Hastings Thermal pool revitalisation;
  - \$500,000 for improved boat and trailer parking for recreational fishing; and
  - **\$1.7 million** for Cape Bruny Car Park and Access upgrade.

### Health, Mental Health and Wellbeing

In 2022-23 and across the forward estimates, an historic investment of \$11.2 billion will be delivered into health, mental health and wellbeing services.

In this Budget we will spend on average \$7.3 million every day on delivering health services to the Tasmanian community.

This Budget includes \$654 million for health infrastructure, including digital health infrastructure, over the next four years as part of the Government's \$1.5 billion spend over 10 years.

#### **Acute and Community Healthcare**

- \$150 million to commence the massive 10-year Improving Patient Care Digital Health Strategy to give more Tasmanians access to the healthcare they need. This investment will include increased virtual care including telehealth, and the development of a statewide integrated care platform to dramatically improve communications and the transfer of information across care settings from hospital to community to GP to paramedics. The benefits to Tasmanians will be more timely access to health care, reduced hospital admissions and cost of care, reduced duplication of testing and administrative work for health professionals, better patient outcomes.
- Continuation of Tasmania's \$196.4 million Statewide Elective Surgery Four-year Plan
   2021-25 – a clinician-led and patient-focussed plan to deliver an additional 30,000 elective surgeries and endoscopies over four years, to achieve a sustainable wait list by 2024-25.
- \$50 million to meet the acute service demand our major hospitals are facing, providing operating funding to keep new beds open, to build on the significant beds and demand funding in the 2021-22 Budget.
- \$12.2 million for Public-Private Partnerships to support the purchase of beds from private hospitals to improve patient flow and deliver increased levels of elective surgery to reduce public waiting lists and help meet demand.
- Over \$44.6 million for community-based care, including the Community Rapid hospital-in-thehome service in all regions of the State, new safety and quality positions to strengthen regulatory oversight and improve clinical safety outcomes, and strengthened in-home palliative care and after hours support for end-of-life care.

- \$4.7 million to extend the Bedside Medication Management trial across our major hospitals

   a new approach with pharmacy technicians working within wards to order, administer and monitor medication, which reduces workload for nurses and increases their time for patient care.
- \$6 million for a new Allied Health Education and Training Program under the new Allied Health Expansion Program, with capacity for more local placements of UTAS students (including physiotherapy and occupational therapy) to help grow and retain our own allied health workforce.
- \$7.2 million for the Outpatient Transformation Project to establish a permanent clinical support team dedicated to statewide outpatient services and improve access for patients to be seen within clinically appropriate timeframes, regardless of where they live.
- \$21.5 million investment in Tasmanian rural hospitals through the allocation of \$17.7 million over four years to implement a Safe Staffing Model and \$3.8 million for additional staff.
- \$4.08 million to implement Our Health Future reforms to establish permanent support resources, to drive and implement the Our Health Future reforms, including strategic and clinical service planning activities and clinical and consumer engagement.
- \$1.8 million to continue oral health support, providing more dental appointments, including \$300,000 for the Royal Flying Doctor Service regional oral health service.
- \$1.46 million to improve Aboriginal Cultural Respect across Tasmania's Health system over four years.

#### Ambulance care

- \$48.6 million to fund
   59 additional paramedics around the State, including the new crews put in place in Hobart and Launceston (24 paramedics), the 24 new rural and regional paramedics and 11 new paramedics for Huonville and Sorell Ambulance Stations.
- \$9 million to continue the new Emergency Mental Health Co-response model (PACER) which, in 15 weeks, has supported 428 clients with 74 per cent of those remaining in the community, instead of being transferred to a hospital ED. We will commence a North-West PACER pilot in early 2023 as the next phase to a statewide model.



#### \$45.2 million

to continue the Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services reform agenda with new services to be established, including a youth forensic service and a specialist service for children in out of home care.

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### **Education, Skills and Workforce Growth**

Expenditure on Education, Skills and Training will increase to a record \$8.5 billion over the 2022-23 Budget and Forward Estimates.

This includes \$250 million for new and upgraded schools, classrooms and Child and Family Learning Centres over the Budget and Forward Estimates.

Our plan to increase our education workforce continues with 876 full time equivalent teachers and education staff recruited since 2014 with more to come, and 100 TasTAFE teachers to be recruited.

## Education and educational outcomes

- **\$24 million** to continue to support more students impacted by trauma. To date, there have been 659 students supported from 2020 to 2022.
- \$36.4 million for Safeguarding Children and Young People, implementing recommendations of the Department of Education Inquiry Report, including –

### Housing

The Tasmanian Government is investing a massive \$1.5 billion investment over 10 years to build or acquire 10,000 new social or affordable homes.

The 2022-23 Budget commits a record \$538 million capital funding over the next four years to support Tasmanians to get into a home faster. In addition, we are underpinning home ownership with the First Home Owner Grant, freeing up residential land, lifting land tax thresholds, the new Housing Market Entry program and stamp duty concessions.

## Boosting social and affordable housing

- Funding of \$538 million is allocated over the next four years to build and acquire thousands of new social housing and affordable housing dwellings, as part of our \$1.5 billion spend over 10 years.
- A new Statutory Authority will be established by October 2022 with the capacity to borrow and invest in even more social and affordable housing for Tasmanians.

## Supported accommodation and homelessness

- **\$1 million** for the Dispersed Youth Foyer, 10 three to four-bedroom shared Housing Tasmania properties.
- \$2.5 million to support the operations of the Devonport Men's Shelter – a new 8-unit facility for homeless men, including a family unit to accommodate men with children.
- **\$255,000** to support the Housing and Accommodation Support Initiative over three years, to provide five homes to support people leaving mental health inpatient care.
- **\$172,000** in 2022-23 for the continued operation of 18 units of crisis accommodation managed by Bethlehem House.
- Continuing of COVID Housing support measures in 2022-23 including \$3.2 million over two years for Youth to Independence homes, \$6.9 million for Statewide Safe Spaces, \$950,000 for Family Violence Rapid Rehousing and \$277,000 for the Hobart Women's Shelter Emergency response.

### \$3 million

to complete the \$5.2 million youth housing and homelessness initiatives around the State.

### \$9.25 million

to extend the Private Rental Incentive Scheme, which provides a financial incentive to property owners to make their home available for affordable rent to housing register applicants.



## Helping more Tasmanians into home ownership

- Increase the property value threshold for stamp duty concessions to \$600,000, delivering a 50% reduction for those buying a first home or pensioners downsizing
   a maximum saving of around \$11,000.
- Extend our 'headworks holiday' program, doubling the Residential Land Rebate from \$15 million to \$30 million, to accelerate vacant land supply.
- From 1 July, extend the thresholds and eligibility for our successful HomeShare program (Housing Market Entry Program) - allowing more Tasmanians who meet income and assets tests to access the program, while reducing the requirement for a deposit to 2% of the purchase price, and doubling the State's equity contribution to a maximum of \$200,000 or 40% for new homes/units and up to \$150,000 or 30% for eligible established homes or units. The Program will be open to eligible First Home Buyers to purchase existing dwellings for the first time.
- An additional \$2.5 million to double the funding commitment to \$5 million for the highly successful ancillary dwelling grant program

   to provide an extra 250 rental properties, doubling the initial 250 places allocated.
- **\$1 million** allocated to support the implementation of the National Electronic Conveyancing System, to enhance lodgement systems, processes and practices to achieve efficiencies and reduce costs in conveyancing.

#### Safeguarding our Children and Young People

While the Government will implement all recommendations from the Commission of Inquiry into Tasmanian Government's Responses to Child Sexual Abuse in Institutional Settings, we are not waiting until it is finalised to act, and will deliver additional initiatives to safeguard children and young people.

The 2022-23 Budget includes funding for new school safeguarding officers in every Government school, additional support for students impacted by trauma, and new multi-disciplinary sexual violence support services.

- \$36.4 million for Safeguarding Children and Young People in Schools, including:
  - Appointing School Safeguarding Officers in every Government school;
  - Mandatory professional development for all Education Department staff;
  - An additional 4 FTE senior support staff with specialist expertise to support children and young people affected by harmful sexual behaviours; and
  - Additional professional support staff eight psychologists and eight social workers to support student wellbeing and safety.
- \$758,000 for the Teachers Registration Board to support the investigation of complaints and disciplinary processes.
- \$2.2 million for the whole of Government Response Unit to deliver a coordinated Tasmanian Government response to Commission of Inquiry.
- \$240,000 to build shared capability for serious investigations related to code of conduct breaches across the State Sector
- \$2.5 million towards the design and implementation of a Child and Youth Safe Organisations Framework, legislated child safe standard and a reportable conduct scheme.

### **Cost of living**

In 2022-23 and across the Forward Estimates, the Government will provide \$305 million in concessions for vulnerable Tasmanians to help them met the costs of essentials, like water, electricity and local council rates.

- \$39.1 million over four years in concessions for water and sewerage bills, where eligible pensioners and those on low incomes received a concession of up to \$205.22 in the 2021-22 year. This concession is indexed annually to Hobart CPI.
- \$79.2 million over four years in remissions (discounts) for council rates for eligible Tasmanians, with a discount of up to 30 per cent provided.
- \$185.8 million over the next four years to assist eligible concession card customers to manage their electricity bills.
- These concessions are revised annually to reflect any increase in the standing offer prices approved by the Tasmanian Economic Regulator.
- Over the past seven years, in real terms, regulated energy prices have decreased by 18 per cent for residential customers and over 27 per cent for small business customers.

- Delivering free sanitary items in all Tasmanian Government schools;
- Continuing our \$1.4 million investment into expanding the school lunch pilot to an addition 30 schools, so all students have access to nutritious food;

- Increased funding for emergency food relief and food vans across the State to \$3 million, supporting vulnerable individuals and families;
- Ongoing investment to support to the No Interest Loan Scheme (NILS) to help more Tasmanians access safe, fair and affordable credit when they need it;
- Providing funding through the ongoing Family Assistance Program to provide direct relief to families suffering financial hardship;
